

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FROM THE MEDICAL DIRECTOR




SOCIAL DISTANCE "thumbs up!"

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
IN IT FOR THE LONG RUN

PICC Board Member Monica Ochs doesn't just run marathons. She competes in ultra distance trail running grueling 100-mile races that wind along mountain trails and last 24 hours or more. A seasoned veteran in the sport, she's sponsored by Patagonia and travels the world to compete. That tells you something about Monica. When she dedicates herself to something, she gives it her all, and she's in it for the long run.

Monica brings that same passion to her long-standing support of the babies at Pediatric Interim Care Center. Her involvement goes back to PICC's very early days, and through all the twists and turns of her life, it has never stopped. In 1991 Monica had just graduated with a degree in social work. As part of her internship, she came to see the new program in Kent that was caring for infants exposed to drugs. "I thought PICC was the best thing ever, and I just wanted a job there so bad. I told Barbara she didn't even have to pay me—just let me work here."

Barbara did hire Monica, and for several years she made home visits to check on the babies who had been recently discharged. "I loved seeing the happy endings, and I fell in love with every little baby that came into the nursery." One baby girl especially touched her heart. Little Emma had no contacts from parents or family throughout her stay at PICC.


Even though Monica



Monica's time as a staff member at PICC ended when she married attorney Kristjan Ochs, and the couple moved first to Skagit County, and then to Anacortes. They adopted Emma and had a son named Riley. When the children were school-age, Monica went back to college and got a degree in nursing. "Nursing was something I had always wanted do," Monica explained. "I worked mainly in family practice, but I've also been a doula (childbirth coach) and a volunteer for earthquake relief in Nepal and HIV clinics in Kenya. With the coronavirus outbreak, I've been taking swabs at the testing sites here in Anacortes."

Today Monica's children are grown and following their own dreams. PICC "graduate" Emma is 28 and starting her own personal chef business. "She's always been very artistic and creative, and she loves to cook," Monica told us. Son Riley was just accepted to medical school. With the kids on their own, Monica called Barbara in 2018 about coming back to PICC as a volunteer. A regular commute from Anacortes wasn't practical, but Barb asked if Monica would be willing to make the long drive to serve on PICC's Board of Directors. We are so happy that Monica said yes. She brings to the board her rich life experience, her passion for children, and the incredible perseverance of a long distance runner.
